## Surah Al-Fatiha (Verses 1-7)

### Overview

Although Surah Al-Fatiha doesn't narrate a story, it strongly emphasizes devotion through prayer and surrender to Allah.



### Core Message

Surah Al-Fatiha highlights praise for Allah (SWT), seeking His mercy, and asking for guidance on the righteous path.



### Featured Verse

"It is You we worship and You we turn to for help."  
(Al-Fatiha, verse 5)



### Main Concepts



Praise: Expressing admiration and gratitude to Allah (SWT)  
Guidance: Requesting direction towards the straight path  
Prayer: Calling upon Allah for help and support



### Central Theme

Worship, Prayer & Dependence on Allah

## Surah Al-Baqarah (Verses 1-20)

### Overview

No specific story is mentioned in this section, but it outlines the distinctions between true believers, disbelievers, and hypocrites.

### Main Focus

These verses shed light on the contrast between people of faith and those who reject it or pretend to accept it. The importance of seeking and following Allah's (SWT) guidance is emphasized.

### Highlighted Verse

"Allah (SWT) leads the faithful from darkness into light."  
(Al-Baqarah, 2:257)

### Overview

This section recounts the creation of Prophet Adam (AS) and his spouse, their life in Paradise, and their eventual expulsion after eating from the forbidden tree due to Iblis's deception.

### Main Focus

It shares Allah's (SWT) guidance, the origin of humankind, the blessings of Paradise, and the consequences of disobedience.

### Highlighted Verse

"O Adam, dwell with your wife in Paradise and eat freely from wherever you wish."  
(Al-Baqarah, 2:35)

### Core Concepts

**Creation:** The origin of humanity and the beginning of life  
**Paradise:** A place full of Allah's (SWT) favors and peace  
**Expulsion:** Removal from Paradise after eating the forbidden fruit, influenced by Iblis

### Central Theme

Creation, Guidance, and the Fall from Paradise

## Surah Al-Baqarah (Verses 40-103)



### Story

This section recounts the story of the golden calf. While Prophet Musa (AS) was on Mount Sinai, some of the Israelites crafted and worshipped a golden calf. Upon returning, Musa (AS) attempted to guide them back to the truth.



### Main Message

These verses highlight Allah's (SWT) favors upon Bani Israel, their continued disobedience, their desire for worldly things over divine provision, and how patience is essential in trials.



### Highlighted Verse

"Indeed, Allah is with those who are patient."  
(Al-Baqarah, 2:153)



### Key Concepts

Verse 61: Bani Israel complained about the food Allah (SWT) provided and requested lesser substitutes.

Verse 102: The topic of magic is addressed, emphasizing that magic has no power except by Allah's (SWT) will.



### Central Theme

Divine Blessings, Human Disobedience, and the Value of Patience

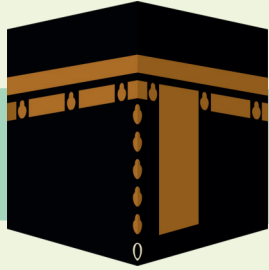

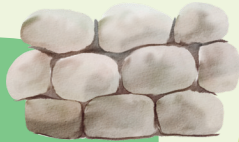


## Surah Al-Baqarah (Verses 104-141)



### Story

This section recounts how Prophet Ibrahim (AS) and his son Ismail (AS), under Allah's (SWT) guidance, laid the foundations of the Kaaba. It also stresses the significance of the Hanif (pure monotheist) faith.



### Main Focus

It addresses both Jews and Christians, clarifying that Prophet Ibrahim (AS) followed neither group but was instead a sincere monotheist who submitted only to Allah (SWT).



### Highlighted Verse

"Ibrahim was neither a Jew nor a Christian, but he was a true Muslim, devoted to monotheism."  
(Al-Baqarah, 2:135)

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### Key Concepts

**Hanif:** One who wholeheartedly believes in Allah (SWT) and practices pure monotheism

**Monotheism:** The belief in the oneness and singularity of Allah (SWT)



### Main Theme

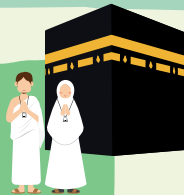

## Surah Al-Baqarah (Verses 142-176)

### Story

This passage highlights the significant moment when Allah (SWT) changed the Qibla (direction of prayer) from Jerusalem to the Kaaba, establishing a unique identity for the Muslim Ummah.



### Main Message

These verses emphasize the shift in prayer direction, and also cover the importance of Islamic rituals like prayer and fasting, reflecting discipline and devotion in worship.



### Key Concepts

**Qibla:** The sacred direction toward which Muslims face during prayers  
**Worship:** Acts of devotion and obedience performed to draw closer to Allah (SWT)  
**Sharia:** The framework of Islamic law that guides moral and spiritual living



### Highlighted Verse

"Indeed, We have directed you to turn your face towards the Kaaba."  
(Al-Baqarah, 2:144)

## Surah Al-Baqarah (Verses 177-202)

### Story

Verse 177 defines righteousness not by outward acts but by genuine faith and good character. Verses 178-179 address the concept of legal justice (Qisas) while encouraging forgiveness. Verses 183-187 discuss the rulings of fasting during Ramadan.



### Main Message

This section outlines core aspects of moral conduct, justice, and religious obligations—highlighting the essence of worship through acts like fasting, charity, and pilgrimage.



### Highlighted Verse

"Righteousness is not in turning your faces toward the east or the west, but in truly believing in Allah, the Last Day, the Angels, the Book, and the Prophets."  
(Al-Baqarah, 2:177)

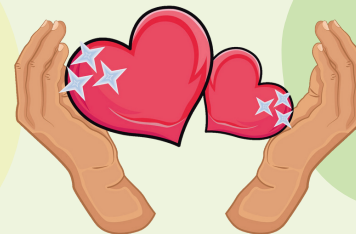

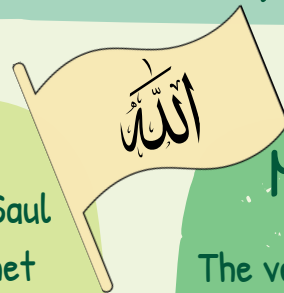


## Surah Al-Baqarah (Verses 203-252)



### Story

This section includes the story of Saul (Talut), Goliath (Jalut), and Prophet David (Dawud, AS), particularly their battles and Allah's support for the believers. Key topics include jihad (striving in Allah's cause) and economic justice through the prohibition of interest.



### Main Message

The verses teach about courage, sacrifice, righteous struggle, and just economic practices. It emphasizes sincere devotion through both action and fair financial dealings.



### Highlighted Verse

"Those who strive with their wealth and their lives in Allah's cause are in the highest ranks."  
(Al-Baqarah, 2:207)

### Key Concepts

Jihad: Struggling sincerely in the way of Allah (SWT), whether through action, wealth, or intention  
Interest (Riba): The unjust gain from lending money is forbidden in Islam

## Surah Al-Baqarah (Verses 253-286)



### Story

Verse 258 presents a dialogue between Prophet Ibrahim (AS) and King Nimrod. It continues with the story of Prophet Uzayr (AS), who was brought back to life after 100 years. In verse 260, Prophet Ibrahim (AS) asks Allah (SWT) how He revives the dead, and Allah shows him using birds.

### Main Message

These verses stress the importance of free will in faith, giving in charity, avoiding interest (riba), and affirming the power and majesty of Allah (SWT), especially through Ayat al-Kursi.

### Highlighted Verse

"Allah! There is no deity except Him, the Ever-Living, the Sustainer of all existence."  
(Al-Baqarah, 2:255 - Ayat al-Kursi)

### Key Concepts

**Riba (Interest):** Verses 275-281 clearly forbid usury and encourage its abandonment  
**Ayat al-Kursi:** A powerful verse describing Allah's greatness and authority over all creation  
**Prophethood:** Allah (SWT) has favored certain prophets over others by His wisdom

200 Verses

## Surah Aal-Imran (Verses 1-32)

### Story

These verses focus on the absolute oneness of Allah (SWT), affirming that Jesus (AS) is a prophet, not divine. It highlights the birth of Maryam (Mary), the miraculous creation of Jesus (AS), and the mission of Allah’s messengers. The passage also addresses the People of the Book, inviting them to the path of monotheism.

### Main Message

The section clarifies the human nature of Jesus (AS), emphasizes monotheism, and elevates Maryam’s honored status in Islam, calling Jews and Christians to the shared truth.

### Highlighted Verse

“O People of the Book, come to a common word between us and you: that we worship none but Allah.”  
(Aal-Imran, 3:64)

### Key Concepts

- Monotheism: Belief in the absolute oneness of Allah (SWT)
- Jesus (AS): Recognized in Islam as a prophet and messenger—not divine
- Maryam (AS): Revered as the mother of Jesus (AS) and one of the most virtuous women in Islam
- People of the Book: A respectful term for Jews and Christians in the Qur’an

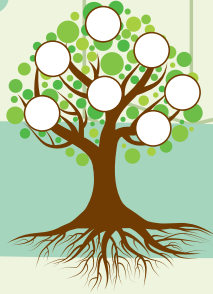

200 Verses



## Surah Aal-Imran (Verses 33-92)



### Story

This passage highlights the miraculous birth of Maryam (Mary), her special status chosen by Allah (SWT), and the appointment of Isa (Jesus) as a prophet. It showcases Maryam's piety and Allah's support for His chosen messengers.



### Main Message

The section emphasizes gratitude for Allah's blessings, sincerity in following His guidance, and calling others to the path of truth.



### Highlighted Verse

“Indeed, Allah chose Mary and purified her, and He chose her above all women of the worlds.”  
(Aal-Imran, 3:42)



### Key Concepts

- Maryam (AS): Chosen by Allah (SWT) for her unmatched piety and honored above all women
- Isa (AS): Appointed by Allah as a prophet with a special mission
- Abraham (AS): Mentioned as a figure of true faith – not tied to any religious label, but as one who truly submitted to Allah
- Muslims: Described as those most connected to the legacy of Ibrahim (AS)

# JUZ 4

200 Verses

## Surah Aal-Imran (Verses 93-200)

### Story

This passage recounts the events of the Battle of Uhud, the struggles faced by the Muslim army, and the mistakes that were made. Despite setbacks, Allah’s (SWT) support helped the Muslims recover. It emphasizes the importance of faith, unity, and learning from hardship.

### Main Message

The verses affirm Jesus’ humanity, highlight the need for sincere reliance on Allah (SWT), and stress that ultimate victory comes from obedience and divine support.

### Highlighted Verse

“If Allah helps you, no one can defeat you; but if He abandons you, who is there to help you after Him?”  
(Aal-Imran, 3:160)

### Key Concepts

Trust in Allah (SWT): True strength lies in divine support  
Battle of Uhud: Strategic errors and divine lessons for the Muslims  
Accountability: Misuse of public trust (e.g., state funds) is condemned  
Divine Aid: The angels were sent as help in moments of true reliance and obedience

## Surah An-Nisa (Verses 1-23)



### Story

Verses 19-23 cover rulings on dowry (mahr), the categories of women forbidden for marriage, and the obligation to give dowry after divorce. This section also expands on related matters in family law and relationships.



### Main Message

The passage emphasizes women's rights, inheritance laws, marriage regulations, and the structure of family and society, all governed by justice.

### Highlighted Verse

"Allah instructs you concerning the inheritance of your children..."  
(An-Nisa, 4:11)



### Key Concepts

**Inheritance:** Fair distribution of wealth among family members, as instructed by Allah

**Marriage & Divorce:** Guidelines on dowry, lawful and unlawful relations, and post-divorce obligations

**Polygamy:** Mentioned in verse 3 – allowed under strict conditions of fairness and justice

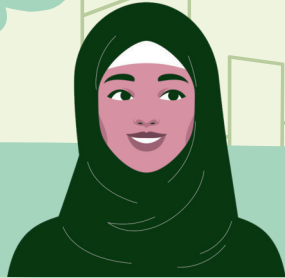

## Surah An-Nisa (Verses 24-147)



### Story



Verse 34 introduces the concept of "qawwam", explaining the role and responsibility of men in leading the household. The verses emphasize the value of turning to arbitration when facing family disputes. Verses 127-130 continue with rulings concerning women and marital disagreements.



### Main Message



This section touches on family leadership, justice in marriage, care for orphans, ethical conduct in warfare, and the principles of fairness and peace in society.



### Highlighted Verse

"If two groups of believers fight, make peace between them."  
(An-Nisa, 4:35)



### Key Concepts



Orphan Rights: Ensuring protection of orphans' property and fair treatment  
Warfare Ethics: Upholding moral standards during war and promoting peace  
Household Responsibility: Guidance for resolving conflicts within families

### Main Message

These verses focus on upholding justice, respecting the rights of others—especially the vulnerable—and establishing fairness in faith, community life, and inheritance matters.



### Highlighted Verse

"O you who believe! Obey Allah and obey the Messenger and those in authority among you."  
(An-Nisa, 4:59)



### Key Concepts

**Orphans' Rights:** Ensuring that orphaned children are treated fairly and their assets are protected  
**Inheritance:** Equitable and just distribution of wealth according to divine guidance

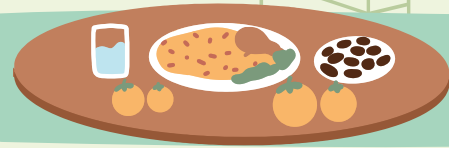

## Surah Al-Ma'idah (Verses 1-82)



### Story

This section includes the story of the disciples of Prophet Isa (Jesus, AS) requesting a table of food from the heavens. It teaches about obedience, gratitude, and the importance of faith through this divine event.



### Main Message

These verses emphasize Allah's (SWT) commands, the importance of staying loyal to promises, halal and haram rulings, and standing firm for truth and justice.



### Highlighted Verse

"O you who believe! Stand firmly for Allah as bearers of justice."  
(Al-Ma'idah, 5:8)



### Key Concepts

- Halal & Haram: Clear guidance on what is permissible and forbidden in food and conduct
- Wudu & Tayammum: Instructions on ritual purification through water or dust (dry ablution)
- Justice: Strong emphasis on fairness in testimony
- Theft & Banditry: Verses 33-39 outline the consequences for stealing and spreading corruption

## Surah Al-Ma'idah (Verses 83-120)



### Story

This section describes the disciples' request for Prophet Isa (Jesus, AS) to ask Allah (SWT) to send down a heavenly table of food. It highlights the testing of their faith and Allah's power through this miracle.



### Main Message

These verses discuss differences between Christian and Jewish beliefs, the reasons for sending prophets, divine commandments, and the signs shown through Isa's (AS) miracles.



### Highlighted Verse

"Jesus, son of Mary, said: 'O Allah, our Lord! Send down to us a table spread with food from the sky...'"  
(Al-Ma'idah, 5:114)



### Key Concepts

- Faith and Miracles: The heavenly feast symbolizes divine power and tests of belief
- Prohibition of Alcohol: Verses 90-91 prohibit all forms of intoxication
- Hunting Laws: Verses 94-96 address rulings related to hunting, especially during sacred times

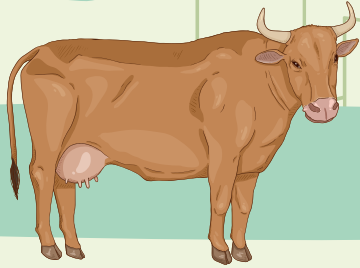

# JUZ 7

165 Verses



## Surah Al-An'am (Verses 1-110)



### Story

These verses emphasize the oneness of Allah (SWT) and reject the beliefs of those who associate others with Him. Prophets are sent to guide humanity to the truth. The verses also reflect on the wisdom behind creation and warn about the reality of the Hereafter and the Day of Judgment.



### Main Message

This part of the Surah addresses monotheism, the falsehood of polytheism, the divine role of prophets, and Allah's signs within creation.

### Highlighted Verse

"It is He who created the heavens and the earth in truth."  
(Al-An'am, 6:73)



### Key Concepts



Tawheed (Monotheism): The absolute oneness of Allah (SWT)

Creation as a Sign: The skies, earth, and creatures all point to divine wisdom

Prophethood: 17 of the 25 prophets mentioned in the Qur'an are named in verses 82-90

Afterlife: Reminder of accountability and judgment after death

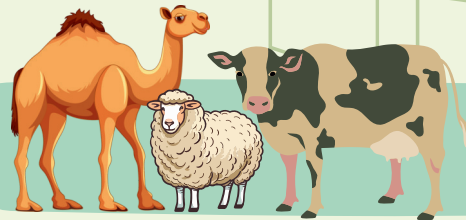

165 Verses



## Surah Al-An'am (Verses 111-165)



### Story

These verses highlight Allah's (SWT) creative power and His all-encompassing knowledge. They describe how prophets are sent to guide humanity and their perseverance in doing so. The passage critiques the flawed arguments of disbelievers and presents a vivid depiction of the Day of Judgment and the afterlife.

### Main Message

This section highlights Allah's knowledge of the unseen, warns against false beliefs, and affirms the prophets' mission and the truth of the Hereafter.

### Highlighted Verse

"To Allah belongs the knowledge of the unseen in the heavens and the earth."  
(Al-An'am, 6:59)

### Key Concepts

Knowledge of the Unseen: Only Allah knows what is hidden beyond our perception  
Day of Judgment: A detailed description of the afterlife and reward/punishment  
Reward for Good Deeds: Verse 160 states that every good action is rewarded tenfold  
Avoiding Sin: Verse 120 instructs believers to stay away from all kinds of sin, whether visible or hidden

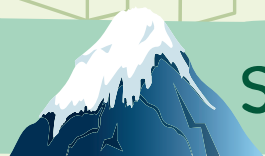

206 Verses



## Surah Al-A'raf (Verses 1-87)



### Story

Prophet Nuh (Noah) preached to his people for many years. When they rejected his message, he built an ark by Allah's (SWT) command and saved the believers from the great flood.



### Main Message

This section recounts the stories of past prophets, their communities' responses, and the importance of faith, obedience, and trust in Allah (SWT). It highlights the warnings given and the consequences of ignoring them.

### Highlighted Verse

"Indeed, your Lord is Allah, who created the heavens and the earth in six days, then established Himself above the Throne."  
(Al-A'raf, 7:54)



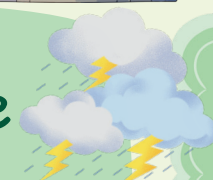
### Key Concepts

Gratitude: Acknowledging and being thankful for Allah's blessings

# JUZ 9

REVEALED IN: MECCA

206 Verses

## Surah Al-A'raf (Verses 88-206)

### Story

These verses recount the story of Musa (Moses) and Pharaoh. Despite being sent with Allah's (SWT) message, Pharaoh rejects the truth and is ultimately drowned in the Red Sea. The verses also cover the story of Prophet Shu'ayb and the people of Midian, who are warned against dishonest trading but refuse to reform.

### Main Message

The section highlights the missions of past prophets, the rewards for the faithful, and the consequences for those who reject Allah's commands – with a focus on the events in Egypt and the trials faced by Musa (AS).

### Highlighted Verse

"Say, 'My Lord has commanded justice and that you remain devoted to Him at every place of worship. Call upon Him, being sincere in your faith.'"  
(Al-A'raf, 7:29)

### Key Concepts

- Obedience: Fulfillment of duties and worship sincerely
- Consequences: Outcomes for both faithfulness and defiance
- Creation & Responsibility: Humans are created with a purpose – to obey and worship Allah (SWT)

### Additional Note

Verses 189-190 mention a couple who prays to Allah (SWT) for a healthy child and vows to be thankful, but once their wish is granted, they fail to honor their promise.

## Surah Al-Anfal (Verses 1-40)



### Story



This portion of the Surah recounts the Battle of Badr, the first major victory of the Muslims despite being outnumbered. This triumph was made possible by Allah's (SWT) support and the firm belief of the Muslims.

### Main Message



These verses focus on the events of Badr, strategies used, the fair division of war gains, and the believers' loyalty and obedience to Allah (SWT). It emphasizes unity and justice in all communal matters.

### Highlighted Verse

"Say, 'My Lord has commanded justice and that you remain devoted to Him at every place of worship, and call upon Him with sincerity in faith.'"  
(Al-A'raf, 7:29)



### Key Concepts



**Spoils of War:** Wealth obtained in battle and guidelines for distributing it fairly  
**Unity:** The significance of standing together as one community

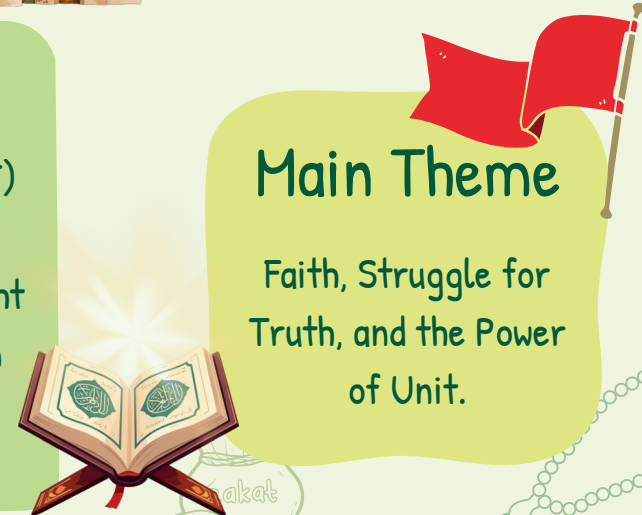

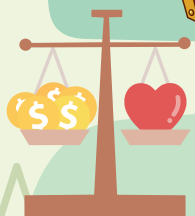

### Main Message

This section highlights the relationship between the early Muslim emigrants (Muhajirun) and the helpers of Medina (Ansar), emphasizing justice, brotherhood, and unity in faith and resources.

### Highlighted Verse

"Know that whatever you acquire of war booty—then indeed, one-fifth of it is for Allah and the Messenger, his close relatives, orphans, the needy, and the stranded traveler."  
(Al-Anfal, 8:41)



### Key Concepts

## Surah At-Tawbah (Verses 1-93)



### Story

This section recounts the Expedition of Tabuk, where the Muslims bravely marched toward the powerful Byzantine Empire. While the sincere believers showed courage and commitment, the hypocrites stayed behind making false excuses.



### Main Message



These verses discuss the annulment of treaties with those who betrayed Islam, the test of faith during Tabuk, and the contrast between true believers and hypocrites. A four-month grace period is also declared for the disbelievers.



### Highlighted Verse

"O you who believe! Fear Allah and be with those who are truthful."  
(At-Tawbah, 9:119)



### Key Concepts

**Sincerity in Faith:** True believers stand firm with honesty and courage  
**Repentance:** Allah (SWT) accepts sincere repentance from those who turn back to Him  
**Hypocrisy Exposed:** Hypocrites are warned for pretending to support Islam while harming it from within

### Additional Note

Verse 40 references the moment in the Cave of Thaur, when Prophet Muhammad and Abu Bakr (RA) hid from their enemies during the migration to Medina.

129 Verses

## Surah At-Tawbah (Verses 94-129)



### Story

Upon the return from the Expedition of Tabuk, many hypocrites began making false excuses. Allah (SWT) distinguishes between sincere believers and hypocrites. He also accepts the repentance of those who sincerely regretted not joining the expedition.



### Main Message

These verses expose the false justifications of the hypocrites, while highlighting Allah's mercy toward those who are truly remorseful. It also emphasizes the clear distinction between genuine believers and those who pretended to follow Islam.



### Key Concepts

- Repentance & Regret: Sincere remorse leads to Allah's forgiveness
- Hypocrisy Uncovered: Allah (SWT) reveals the lies of those who feigned loyalty
